 Each had a prayer identity. Each had a prayer activity.
3. Each saw God in a special way.
The key to the following exercise is to place yourself in their position and sometime "read between the lines."
CORNELIUS Read Acts 10:1-8, 30-33 Luke described the Gentile Cornelius with four phrases: He was a devout man, he feared God, he gave many alms to the Jewish people, and he prayed to God continually.
What was the prayer identity of Cornelius? <u>a God-fearer</u> :
What was his most important prayer activity? <u>He was not a Jew, but he sought the God of the</u>

Jews by pray Thus, he pursued an important prayer activity, seeking God.

Who was God for Cornelius? <u>He had already claimed an allegiance to the God of the Jews.</u>

Cornelius's prayers must have been very effective with God; because the angel declared, "Thy prayers and thin alms are come up for a memorial before God." God moved in a way that was to change the history of the world. His prayers effectively opened the door of Christianity to the Gentile world.

Daniel's enemies wanted to get rid of the competition. They knew of his consistency in prayer.

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And so they decided this was the one aread in which they could trap him (Dan. 6:5). What trap did they set?
