The Fifth Petition
The fifth petition is "AND FORGIVE US OUR TRESPASSES, AS WE FORGIVE THOSE WHO TRESPASS AGAINST US."
What do we acknowledge about ourselves when we pray this petition?
This petition can be translated two different ways.
A. "Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us."
B. "Forgive us our trespasses, for we forgive those who trespass against us."
There is a difference in meaning in the two translations.
The first means that we ask God to forgive us when and if we forgive
Read Matthew 18:23-35. What is the point of this parable?

Matthew 7:2 says "with what measure you measure, it will be measured to you again." "Measure" here means the standard you use. With this in mind, rewrite Matthew 7:2 in you own words.
The second translation of this petition suggested above means that Christians will
